6. There will be no viva-voce for any of the examinations except for CC-11-P of Semester V.
7. Prior to the announced date of the examinations, laboratory notebooks should be sent by the candidates to the college in PDF formats. The dates of receiving the PDF files will be decided by the respective colleges but will have to be prior to the dates of examination as announced by the University (but see 8c, below). The candidates will be examined on the basis of their laboratory notebooks for 5 marks.
8. Viva-voce norms for GEO-A-CC-5-11-P Research Methodology and Fieldwork Lab (marks division: 20 on report + 10 on viva-voce = 30):
 - a. Viva-voce will be arranged by the respective colleges according to their convenience, between 21 and 27 January 2022.
 - b. Mode of viva-voce may be either online or offline as decided by the respective colleges.
 - c. In the events of offline viva-voce, the colleges can accept hard copies of Field Reports from the candidates.
 - d. Viva-voce can be taken on one single day or on multiple days as decided by the respective colleges.
 - e. Under no circumstance the viva-voce for one candidate should exceed 10 minutes.





REPORT :
